Credit Accumulation and Transfer System (CATS) in Hong Kong

- A Suggested Implementation Framework



#### Background

"Aspirations for the Higher Education System in Hong Kong" (the HER Report) published in December 2010 recommended that:

- a "transparent and trustworthy CATS should be developed for the whole post-secondary system" (Recommendation 6); and
- such system should be "appropriate for articulation between different levels and across different institutions at the same level" (Recommendation 37).



#### Background

In its response to the *HER Report* issued in November 2011, the Government expressed support for the UGC's proposal to develop vertical CATS to facilitate articulation from sub-degree programmes to senior year of undergraduate studies.

The UGC was tasked to conduct more research on CATS in other jurisdictions and propose an implementation plan applicable to both the publicly-funded and self-financed institutions.



# Highlights of UGC's Proposed Implementation Plan



#### **Current Situation in Hong Kong**

#### Even without a detailed framework, necessary elements of CATS already exist:

- A Qualifications Framework (QF)
- An Accreditation Authority the Hong Kong Council for Accreditation of Academic and Vocational Qualifications (HKCAAVQ)
- UGC-funded institutions already attach credits to their programmes and to the subcomponents (modules) of their programmes
- UGC-funded institutions already admit students with lower level qualifications onto their undergraduate programmes, giving them various amounts of credit for their previous study



#### **Current Situation in Hong Kong**

**Problems with the development of CATS:** 

The imbalance between student demand and the availability of places in higher education institutions (UGC-funded or not)

- → keen competition for places
- institutions are under <u>less</u> pressure to respond to students' demand and to develop a system for students' navigation and progression
- the incentive for the sector to develop a

  → comprehensive CATS in Hong Kong is not strong



#### **Current Situation in Hong Kong**

#### Problems with the development of CATS (cont'd):

- Lack of a common basis for calculating credits across the entire sector
- Lack of a common credit amount for the attainment of qualifications
- Lack of a common practice in articulating qualifications
- Lack of a common practice in admission of students from lower level to higher level qualifications
- No single quality assurance body
- articulation arrangements unpredictable and not transparent to students



## Purpose of Strengthening CATS in Hong Kong

#### A credit framework could:

- permit a student to gain a post-secondary education qualification in different institutions and at different times and that students maturing at different stages could all benefit
- help bind together UGC-funded institutions with other institutions so that the entire postsecondary system could act more concertedly
- with a transparent and open selection mechanism, students' earlier studies would not be wasted and that they can make betterinformed decisions



### Purpose of Strengthening CATS in Hong Kong

A properly functioning CATS would in principle bring about the following benefits –

- Lifelong learning
- Widening participation
- Flexibility
- Efficiency
- Transparency



#### **Fundamental Principles:**

- Continued respect for academic freedom and institutional autonomy
- The exercise should not necessitate drastic or fundamental changes to the post-secondary education system



1<sup>st</sup> Recommendation of the UGC:

that institutions be invited to negotiate articulation agreements with providers of sub-degree programmes, when approached



2nd Recommendation of the UGC:

that the QF be modified so that it states the number of credits required for a qualification at each level



3rd Recommendation of the UGC:

that a single quality assurance body for all of post-secondary education be established



4th Recommendation of the UGC:

that funded institutions be encouraged to publish the criteria that they use for selecting articulating students and recognising prior learning

that institutions further develop a depository to record and report to the public such information of actual cases
